- GENERAL NEWS:
- 1. Parents (and students) can attend "**How to Help Your Son or Daughter Choose a College**" presentation on Thursday, November 13, 2014 from 6:30-7:30 p.m. in the Community Room. This program is usually offered every-other-year. More details will appear in the Fort Site Journal.
- Junior and Senior Parents—save the date! FRHS will host a <u>Financial Aid Night</u> on Tuesday January 27, 2015 from 6:00-7:30 p.m. in the HS Commons. This presentation will be very helpful in explaining the financial aid process for college.
- 3. Attention parents of college-bound seniors: If possible, try to file your 2014 tax forms before February 15, 2015. This is the FAFSA deadline for many Ohio colleges. (If you are unable to file by this date, don't worry— you can estimate your AGI, etc. on the FAFSA and revise those numbers later.)
- 4. Check out the high school calendar on the school website to stay informed of what is happening at FRHS!
- 5. All FRHS Sophomores attended a **Tri-Star** Orientation on November 4. Everyone received a program catalog, information sheet, and field trip form later in the week. Tri-Star tours will be December 9. If any parent is interested in chaperoning, contact Amy Kaiser at <u>kaisera@fortrecoveryschools.org</u>.
- 6. Are you making good life decisions for your future? This is a good question for students to ask themselves as they transition to adulthood. Getting a DUI or being convicted of a crime could prohibit you from becoming hired/certified in the career field of your choice, or from enlisting in the military. Think about what impact your actions and appearance (hairstyle, tattoos, piercings, etc.) will make in getting a job before you do something you may regret later. Listen to your parents—the DO know what they are talking about[©].
- 7. Seniors: create (and use) a "normal" email address (ex: <u>amy.kaiser@gmail.com</u>). You are moving into the "real" world, and colleges and employers frown upon unprofessional email addresses.
- 8. We often get pleas from local companies who are unable to fill their jobs in skilled trades to promote these careers to HS students. Here is an excerpt from a recent email: "Over the course of the past 12 months of intensive searching I have only found two maintenance men and one toolmaker worth hiring. And none of the three were superstars. I still have 7 openings I can't get filled and 73% of my maintenance men and toolmakers are over the age of 55... The bottom line is there simply isn't enough of these people out there ...For kids in local high schools who know they aren't going to college, the skilled trades area is a way to make a very good living without a college degree. A kid can go work on a factory assembly line for \$12-\$20 per hour or he can work in a skilled trade area for \$18-\$30 per hour."

 - The University of Cincinnati now offers a Medical Sciences major, which will prepare students for advanced training in medicine, pharmacy, dentistry, and graduate school in biomedical research. Highlights of the program include: Housed in the College of Medicine, providing students access to medical school faculty and resources. Admission to the major is competitive, and will likely be limited to students that have obtained strong grades and have taken high-level science courses. This major provides a unique opportunity for students to learn more about a medical program before applying to medical or other professional schools. - 35. Prospective College Athletes who plan to play Division I or II sports must register with the appropriate clearinghouse. Both eligibility centers require that test scores (i.e. ACT) be sent directly from the testing agency. See Mrs. Kaiser if you need to register with either of these athletic clearinghouses because I need to mail your transcript to them! Cost is approximately \$65.

Vocational:

- 37. There is a need for **skilled labor positions** (construction, pipe fitting, sheet metal, electricians, ironworkers, HVAC, heavy equipment operators/engineers, cement and masonry, etc.). College:

- 41. Seniors planning to attend a 4-year college should apply by the end of November.
 - ASK if there is a separate financial aid / scholarship application (You should try to get as many scholarships and grants as possible)
 - COMPLETE applications online, in ink, or type. Do not use pencil-appearance is important.
 - IF AN ESSAY IS REQUIRED, please do your best. The essay makes a big difference in admission and scholarship decisions.
 - GIVE DETAILS
 - o don't just say you're a member of a club, tell what you do in that club
 - o give the number of hours you have contributed
 - o explain what challenges you have had, and what you've done to overcome obstacles
 - o if the application doesn't allow you to give details, mail a letter requesting it be added to your file
 - SUBMIT 1-2 LETTERS OF RECOMMENDATION *if* the admission process is competitive
 - OBEY DEADLINES!
 - Let Mrs. Kaiser know when you have completed/submitted your application so she can mail your transcript to the university.

- 42. College Essays: Many colleges require an essay for admission and/or scholarship consideration. Here is some helpful advice:
 - Ask the admissions representative HOW the essays are used (and judged). Will your essay be used for placement into an English course? Used holistically in the admission decision?
 - Write about something personal: a challenge you have faced, someone or something that has had an impact on your life, etc.
 - Have someone proofread and critique your essay.
 - Keep in mind that the people reviewing your essay read <u>thousands</u> of them. Make sure yours is interesting and will be unique!

 - **Preview Rhodes**: November 5 from 6-8 p.m. (perfect for juniors and seniors—RSVP at <u>www.rhodesstate.edu/preview</u>)
 - **Transfer Fair** (for students interested in starting at a community college and transitioning to another college later will be April 1. You can tour Rhodes in the AM and attend the transfer fair in the PM. This is a great way to get a lot done in one day!
- 44. Catalogs are available in the guidance office that highlight ALL of Ohio's 2-Year, Private and Public Colleges. These books are excellent resources for students to make comparisons between schools....they let you know enrollment, tuition rates, admission policies and fees, locations, and much, much more! - 45. Rhodes State students who would like to be considered for 2015 Occupational Therapy Assisting, Physical Therapy Assisting, and Radiographic Imaging clinical entry should begin the selective admissions process this fall. The deadline will be in February. Information can be found at <a href="http://www.rhodesstate.edu/pta_www.rhodesstate.
- 46. **Public or Private College?** Keep all of your options open, and don't rule out Private Colleges based on the cost! In many cases, you can afford the tuition...apply for the scholarships and grants available to you. Sometimes, you can attend a private school for the same price as a public one! <u>Studies show that students</u> who attend private colleges often graduate 1-2 years earlier than those who attend public colleges.
- 47. Notes about a few of Ohio's public universities:
 - Students planning to attend UC must apply by December 1 to be eligible for their full-range of scholarships.
 - UC, OSU and Miami do not accept test scores on student transcripts; scores must be received directly from the testing company (i.e. ACT). Most others prefer the scores are sent directly.
 - The **writing** portion of the ACT/SAT is required for admission to UC, OSU and Toledo, as well as several private colleges. WSU uses it for English placement.
- 48. John Jay Center for Learning (affiliated with Ivy Tech State College and Indiana Wesleyan) in Portland, IN offers beginning-level college courses at a very reasonable cost Call 260-729-5525.
- 49. Several Colleges offer **FREE** (or reduced) **tuition** for students who meet low income qualifications. Here are a few examples:
 - **Miami University Access Initiative**: Miami University will provide tuition and fees for all new first-year students from Ohio entering the Oxford campus that has family incomes of less than \$35,000. The program will continue to provide tuition and fees for eligible students for up to four years.
 - Harvard University (and others) has similar programs. Be sure to ask if you are eligible!

YOU need to ASK the college (or check their financial aid site) if they have such a program. Don't be afraid to apply to your dream school!

Military:

- 50. Attention <u>students in grades 9-11</u>: If you are interested in applying for admission to a US Military Academy, start planning NOW. Academy Nomination Applications (US Air Force, Military, Naval and Merchant Marine Academies) are due in September or October of your senior year. It is a very prestigious honor to attend a military academy, and admission is highly competitive.
 - <u>Junior year is when the Academy application process truly begins</u>. Students will start by filling out the Pre-Candidate Questionnaire, which becomes available online March 1 every year.
 - Between March 1 of their junior year and December 31 of their senior year, students must also request <u>nominations</u> from a designated nomination category.
 - See Mrs. Kaiser ASAP if you are interested in a US Military Academy.
- 51. Interested in joining the military after graduation?
 - There is information in the guidance office on all branches of the military and each service academy.
 - You need to take the ASVAB test to be considered for enlistment.
 - Military recruiters visit FRHS (and homes) throughout the year. For additional information about a career in the military, visit http://todaysmilitary.com/careers.
 - NROTC (full-tuition) scholarships are available.
 - **The Army ROTC** offers many incentives for students who wish to go to college and enlist in the military. Full-ride scholarships are available. Inquire at your desired college to see if an opportunity exists with the ROTC that might be right for you.
 - o University of Dayton contact is Alton Womack, 937/416-5611
 - Attention <u>Juniors</u>: You might want to attend a Summer Seminar to see what life as a cadet is all about. Go to the website of the academy of your choice and look under "Admissions" for more information.

SCHOLARSHIPS / GRANTS / LOANS:

These are in order by due date. See Mrs. Kaiser for additional information.

- 52. **Financial Aid: Seniors need to get a PIN** at <u>www.pin.ed.gov</u> This is one of the things you will need in order to apply for federal financial aid for college—so keep it in a safe place. You will need 2 PINs total: 1 student PIN and 1 parent PIN (parents use the same PIN for all children). Tell your parents to make their tax appointments for January (if possible). This information is necessary to complete the FAFSA (Free Application for Federal Student Aid) in February.
- 53. Don't get scammed on practice tests and financial aid/scholarship apps--watch for warning signs!
 - You have to pay a fee or "taxes"

- Provides "exclusive" information
- Credit card or bank account information required
- Unsolicited emails or phone calls

- Money-back offers or guarantees

Report scams to the proper authorities (BBB, Attorney General, National Fraud Information Center, etc.).
 54. Imagine America Scholarship for 2014 graduates: FRHS can select up to three students to receive this \$1000 scholarship—FRHS will award this to the first 3 eligible students who apply each year. Only recent high school graduates who are qualified applicants and who meet the following recommended guidelines should

- apply: Likelihood of successful completion of postsecondary education, high school grade point average of 2.5 or greater, financial need, and demonstrated voluntary community service during the senior year Students must plan to attend a "career college" (such as Lincoln Tech or Kaplan) to be eligible. Students should visit the website for more information and a list of participating schools. 2015 grads can begin to apply after January 1, 2015. Apply online at www.imagine-america.org.
- 55. **Specialized Carriers & Rigging Foundation** is offering \$1000-\$5000 grants to individuals looking to take a <u>continuing education course (such as welding or diesel mechanics)</u> or attend <u>vocational/technical college</u>. Apply online at <u>https://scrfoundation.fluidreview.com/</u>. Grants are awarded throughout the year.
- 56. Sussle Scholarship (\$500): Sussle is an encyclopedia of the things YOU care about. This is not your usual scholarship. <u>There is no application or essay</u>, and it's actually fun. By participating, you will be posting your knowledge for the benefit of others, and in return, the best contributor will win the scholarship. Eligibility: HS seniors and college students. See <u>http://sussle.org/scholarship</u> to enter. Deadlines: end of each month.
- 57. **Prudential Spirit of Community Scholarship:** <u>Middle or high school students</u> who have made a difference through volunteering can apply online for this \$1,000 award at <u>http://spirit.prudential.com</u>. Submission deadline is November 4.
- Jack Kent Cooke scholarships are available to seniors with a 3.5 GPA, 26 ACT and have a family income of \$95,000 or less. See <u>http://info.jkcf.org/newcollegescholarship</u> for more information. Deadline to apply is November 4.
